Something Special

Last month, the 'SOMETHING SPECIAL' production team visited Bishopswood School, looking for children to be involved in the filming for the next series of the show.

Something Special is a CBeebies programme created to help young SEND children and uses Makaton signs to help pre-vocal children learn to communicate their feelings and desires to their family and friends.

Mr Tumble is the main character in the show and uses his signature visual humour to engage the audience (sadly MrTumble wasn't part of this visit).





We have enjoyed a wonderful few terms filled with exciting activities and enriching experiences. Our older pupils had the fantastic opportunity to participate in the Careers Festival, where they explored various industries and career options. They engaged with new technologies, tried on uniforms, learned about pathways into the army, and even had discussions with scientists about their work.





Our Forest School sessions have continued to be a highlight, with pupils taking part in hedge laying and enjoying the fun of making fresh outdoor pizza. Additionally, we visited a farm where the children had the delightful experience of cuddling newborn lambs.

Our enterprise skills have also flourished, as pupils created a variety of arts and crafts, including decorations and food items, which they sold to fellow pupils, staff, and parents.

Primary School update

We've had some fantastic enrichment activities recently that we'd love to share with you. Our sessions with Make Sense Theatre have been a highlight, featuring interactive storytelling, drama, song, and dance. These sessions are always a hit, and we thoroughly enjoy every moment.

In the classroom, our pupils have been diligently working on their maths skills, particularly focusing on concepts such as "heavy" and "light." Additionally, we have placed a special emphasis on physical movement to help our pupils feel regulated and calm, ready for learning. This includes our morning sensory circuits and horse riding sessions.

Our horse riding sessions have been particularly enjoyable, with pupils gaining confidence and improving their balance on horseback.

Empowering Education: Special School Outreach Initiative




As of January 2024,

services. The primary goal of this initiative
being to empower and upskill staff in
mainstream schools, enabling them to better
address the needs of SEND pupils by
leveraging best practices from special
schools within our Trust.

Jenny Jura is our Special School Outreach Lead and collaborates with colleagues across the Trust to provide tailored support packages to schools that have been referred through the Oxfordshire SENCO Helpdesk.

We are currently supporting over 40 schools and received overwhelming positive feedback. We are hoping to extend the offer in the near future which would allow us to expand our outreach, utilising more staff from our Trust to share our outstanding practice.

The Special School Outreach initiative represents a pivotal moment in our efforts to provide a more inclusive educational environment for all young people in our communities. By sharing expertise and best practices, we aim to build a stronger, more supportive network that meets the diverse needs of students across Oxfordshire.

A great day and the best bit was that we raised an amazing £147.08 for a brilliant cause! Thank you for your generosity.


